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# INCLUSIVE NEIGHBOURHOODS PORTFOLIO OVERVIEW



## Portfolio Summary

This Quarter 4 Portfolio Performance and Resource Report provides a year-end position in relation to the Inclusive Neighbourhoods Portfolio responsibilities.

The overarching priority for this Portfolio, as set out in the Agreement at the start of the year, has been to improve outcomes for all of our communities, so that Stockport is a place people want to live, work and spend their leisure time. Some of the ways that we have done this, as reported during the year have been:

- Empowering communities and connecting people through our £1m Stockport Local Fund with 112 successful applications made to the fund in phase 4;
- Successful recruitment and retention of learners by the Adult Education Service with an increase in the number of learners from the borough's priority areas;
- Partnership work with Police, Youth Offending Service and local schools to tackle anti-social behaviour and raise awareness of hate crime and knife crime.



The final weeks of this reporting period were impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. Although this is not significantly reflected in the 2019/20 performance and finance information, some notable impacts reported here include:

- The implementation of an integrated 'Support Funds' model has been postponed. All aspects of the current Stockport Local Assistance Scheme and Discretionary Housing Payments process have been retained in the short-term and joint work has been undertaken with Citizen's Advice Bureau and Credit Union to support residents who are struggling financially.
- Whilst domestic abuse referrals have been in line with expectations over the last few weeks following an initial drop, the Safer Stockport Partnership is working with safeguarding partnerships and has enhanced communication and support.

The response of the voluntary and community sector during this time has been truly inspirational. We have been working hand-in-hand with amazing VCSE colleagues across the borough to deliver humanitarian aid and ensure that vulnerable people are supported. This includes:

- The establishment of a vibrant VCSE network with membership of over 30 organisations and strong links to community mutual aid networks.
- Working with HealthWatch, we've taken a lead role in developing a volunteer hub that has matched volunteers and organisations. This can be used to shape a model for the future.
- The Stockport Local fund was opened to provide small grants to mobilise the VCSE response and support organisations to keep Covid-19 critical services in operation.

Working together in neighbourhoods and communities is a key priority for this Portfolio. We can build on the excellent work and wealth of community activity that has happened over the past 12 weeks. If we continue to work together, we can ensure that Stockport can recover even stronger.

## 1. DELIVERING OUR PRIORITIES

Due to the current situation and unprecedented levels of demand, this report focuses on out-turn performance and financial data for 2019/20, rather than the usual, more comprehensive round-up of progress against portfolio priorities.

Some data has not been collected, whilst there are some measures for which out-turn data is not yet available, particularly where this comes from external sources. In these cases, the latest data is shown in italics in order to provide a complete picture of performance across the portfolio based on the latest available data.

Consideration is currently being given to the future reporting framework in the light of the Council's response to Covid-19, reflecting the impact of the pandemic and associated measures on key areas of performance in addition to recovery plans for 2020/21 going forward.

<p>Previously published data on the number of VCSE organisations comes from the Centre for Regional Economic and Social Research at Sheffield Hallam University via their State of the Sector Reports. A third State of the Sector report has been commissioned by 10GM however no timescales have been provided for when the report will be published.</p> <p>In lieu of a more recent figure, the number of VCSE organisations can be estimated using data obtained from the Charity Commission website and a standardised approach to measuring 'below the radar' organisations. As of May 2020, it is estimated that Stockport has 1630 VCSE organisations.</p> <p>To develop a more robust figure, the Neighbourhood Inclusion Team are conducting a localised State of the Sector report and a report will be published by Q2 20/21. In addition, the Neighbourhood Inclusion Team will continue to undertake further research into the data available via the Charity Commission. Further updates for Q4;

**Poverty Insights and Financial Resilience** - As part of the partnership approach to tackle holiday hunger and food poverty, a money maximising roadshow was held in Bridgehall during Q4. Over 40 residents accessed the event where they met with 18 different organisations and services.

**Understanding Community Needs** - The Council's Neighbourhood Inclusion Team have conducted research into the lived experience of young people who have been excluded in Stockport. This is in order to inform future commissioning intentions and operational focus in response to the Council's SEND inspection. During Q4, interviews were carried with 21 pupils from Highfields PRU, 8 pupils from Pendlebury PRU and 5 pupils from Windlehurst. The research is currently on hold due to the Covid-19 response.

**Stockport Crisis and Support Fund** - The Council agreed to implement an integrated 'Support Funds' model, to take effect from April 2020. The key features of this model included the integration of the application and back office administration processes of SLAS, Discretionary Housing Payments and Discretionary Council Tax Scheme under the Stockport Support Fund; Stockport Homes to take on a more significant role in supporting their own tenants through increased use of their furnished tenancy and recycled furniture schemes with SHG also administering DHP applications and payments for SHG tenants; and the new service would look to address crisis and resettlement needs through local and national assets. However, in light of the Covid-19 Pandemic, the Council agreed to maintain all aspects of the current SLAS service and DHP process in the short-term (3 months).

### Priority 3: Protecting our communities

*We will work with our local communities, partners and across Greater Manchester through the Safer Stockport Partnership to tackle crime, anti-social behaviour and extremism, strengthen community resilience and support victims.*

A comprehensive range of support is available for victims and perpetrators of domestic abuse, and this has been strengthened since the start of the lockdown in March. Data on repeat victims is not yet available for Q4, but whilst national helplines are seeing a significant increase in calls, this is not being duplicated locally or regionally, based on the number of contacts and referrals.

The next steps are to develop an exit from lockdown response. Whilst there is no evidence that there will be a big increase in referrals once lockdown is eased; it is thought prudent to prepare as though there will be.

Crime data is based on rolling 12-month figures as at Q3 – no further data available from GMP as yet, due to iOPS implementation. Operational information from GMP suggests that crime rates continued to fall during Q4 ahead of the 'lockdown' on 23 March, since when there has been a significant reduction in most crime types. There are notable trends emerging, however, particularly in ASB around enforcing the Covid-19 related restrictions and social distancing. Partners are working through the Safer Stockport Partnership to address these issues, along with planning for a potential rise in crime as and when restrictions are eased.
