Report of the Corporate Director (Place) and Deputy Chief Executive

1. INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE OF REPORT

- 1.1. This report provides details of the proposed transportation capital programme for 2021/22 and indicative programmes for future years.
- 1.2. The transportation capital programme is funded from a variety of sources including Local Transport Plan (LTP) funding via the Greater Manchester Combined Authority, specific grants from Government including pothole funding, and individual scheme bids e.g. the Mayors Walking and Cycling Fund (MCF), Town Centre Access Plan (TCAP) and A6 to Manchester Airport Relief Road (A6MARR). Schemes are also funded by developers via the section 106 and 278 processes. The Council is also borrowing to fund both the Highways Investment Programme (HIP) and the Street Lighting LED Replacement Programme.
- 1.3. LTP for 2021/22 is expected to be £3.131m. Local Transport Plan Funding is used to pay for asset maintenance programmes including Street Lighting, Highways Drainage, Highways Structures, PROW, and Flood Risk Management.

- 3.1.4. This will include £0.482m of works to improve of the Local / District Centres, of which £0.232 has been re-phased from the 2020/21 programme. The centres to be addressed are:
 - Marple Study £0.025m
 - Hazel Grove Study £0.025m
 - Reddish Improvements £0.423m
- 3.1.5. A further £0.030m has been allocated for other studies that will be necessary in the year.
- 3.1.6. Work to improve road safety near schools. The Council is providing £0.100m of funding to investigate road safety issues around their sites and follow up work. Physical measures which may be recommended will vary from school to school but may include:
 - New controlled crossings
 - Upgrades to School Crossing Patrol points
 - Improvements to street lighting
 - Identifying walking routes and preferred uncontrolled crossing points
 - Widening of footways
 - Revised speed limits and waiting restrictions
 - Amended signage
 - Improved road markings.
- 3.1.7. There is also £0.131m of schemes from the 2020/21 programme that still need to be completed as COVID-19 disrupted work. The 2020/21 list is shown below:

- 3.1.9. Further work will be done on the strategic network to improve road safety including:
 - Review of collision hotspots within the borough with a view to providing remedial works; and
 - Ability to provide reactive works should safety concerns come forward throughout the year. For example, providing additional height warning signs in Romiley due to numerous reports of bridge strikes and VAS on Ladybridge Road as a result of speeding vehicles.
- 3.1.10. There will be £0.030m spent on work to increase the highway trees planted across the borough as space allows.
- 3.2. Mayoral Walking & Cycling Challenge Fund (MCF)
- 3.2.1. Schemes are now split between Feasibility, Detailed Design, Construction and Operation as the MCF programme enters its final year further details are provided below. The MCF 2020 prioritisation exercise set out a phased approach to design and deliver schemes up to a value of £27.5m. Of the 14 schemes, development costs for all have been approved while 6 schemes have business case approval with a further 3 pending. Over 2021/22, there is an anticipated spend of £10.570 against Stockport Interchange and £8.846m against all other schemes.
- 3.2.2. These schemes are:
 - Gillbent Road Crossing Upgrade Complete / in operation.
 - Town Centre Severance Package (Welkin Road) Original scope under review / being redeveloped. Approval to develop scheme up to business case submission.

- Hazel Grove Upgrade Package Wider scope being review while business case is being redrafted following TfGM feedback on strategic case. Approval to develop and deliver elements of the scheme with further funding needed to complete entire revised scope.
- Bramhall Park to A6 Approval to deliver entire scope. Delivery in progress.
- Ladybrook Valley Approval to develop and deliver entire scope. Awaiting feedback from TfGM on business case submission.
- Heatons Cycle Link Approval to develop elements of the scheme. Delivery in progress.
- Crossing Package Approval to develop and deliver entire scope of the scheme. Design complete with delivery planned from spring through to summer.
- A6MARR Links Approval to develop and deliver elements of the scheme.
 Delivery in progress.
- Stockport Interchange Approval to develop and deliver all SMBC elements of the MCF funded components of the Interchange scheme (A6 crossing, Station Rd crossing and Mersey Square). Approval to develop and deliver all TfGM elements of the MCF funded components of the Interchange scheme (Bridgescape with rail station and Podium Park).
- Stockport to Offerton Approval to develop and deliver elements of the scheme. Delivery in progress.
- Heaton Norris Park Bridge Approval to develop the scheme up to business case submission. Development of scheme awaiting outcome of application to HE for Designated Funding.
- Heatons WRH Approval to develop the scheme up to business case submission (including any temporary trials).
- Romiley Neighbourhood and Links Approval to develop and deliver Romiley crossings – business case submission planned in spring for a planned start on site later this year. Approval to develop Romiley to Stockport and Romiley Active Neighbourhood (including any temporary trials) up to business case submission.
- Thomson Street Bridge (Edgeley to Stockport) Approval to develop the entire scheme up to business case submission. Approval to deliver replacement of Thomson St Bridge through Network Rail. Due to the extent of the entire scheme, timescales between business case approval and a decision needed by Network Rail to pursue the single option of a wider structure (to accommodate both pedestrians and cyclists) do not align. Authority for SMBC to commit and enter into agreement to fund the wider structure will therefore fall outside of standard MCF governance.

3.6. **Air Quality Grant**

3.6.1. Air Quality Grant of £0.046m is going to provide funding for minor projects to support Air Quality improvements in the borough, to be identified and approved in the year.

3.3. Public Rights of Way/ Walking and Cycling (inc Greenspace)

3.3.1. The LTP and Pothole and Highway Maintenance Improvement Programmes for 2021/22 are proposed to include the following Public Rights of Way/ Walking and Cycling including Greenspace schemes:

- 3.3.2. The infrastructure and accessibility package will identify the infrastructure on the public rights of way within the borough and once this has been achieved will identify the potential to improvements to accessibility for all by addressing issues on the network. This will also build a firm basis for future asset management work.
- 3.3.3. The scheme feasibility package will seek to develop, cost and prioritise capital repairs for the future and then deliver as funds allow.

- 3.8. In addition, the Transforming Cities funding allocated by GMCA has allocated £7m to Greek Street bridge replacement. Officers are working with TfGM and Network Rail to develop a business case and scheme for the replacement of the bridge at Greek Street roundabout, Edgeley. Work on developing this scheme will continue in 21/22.
- 3.9. **Highway Planned Maintenance Programme Carriageway and Footway**
- The proposed HIP programme is £12.826m plus £0.300m for drainage in 3.9.1. 2021/22. The HIP Programme continues in its delivery with work in 2021/22
- 3.9.2. There will still be a focus on specific wards scheduled for works each year but with more flexibility in the programme to address wider concerns in the borough.

3.12. Stockport Town Centre Access Plan

- 3.12.1. Stockport has £1.035m remaining in the programme which will be utilised to deliver the following schemes in **2021/22**:
 - 307C Railway Road/A6 junction (being delivered by MCF with TCAP contribution)
 - 404E Market Place paving
 - 703C Public realm improvements around Marine Conway memorial
 - Wayfinding VMS, fingerposts, car park counters, minor schemes etc.
 - Defects correction across the programme as required
 - Close-out and handover into maintenance
 - TfGM Travel Choices Programme

Monitoring and Evaluation will be undertaken one year after opening.

3.13. **Roscoe's Roundabout** has £0.150m of work to be undertaken to finalise the junction improvements started in 2019.

3.14. A6 Manchester Airport Relief Road and Poynton Relief Road

- 3.14.1. There is £3.387m to be utilised to address issues identified with the A6MARR such as snagging or following road safety audits, complete land transactions and to provide any necessary compensation needed as a result of the road scheme in **2021/22** with a further £1.883m in **2022/23** and £11.883 in **2023/24**.
- 3.14.2. For the Poynton Relief Road there is £4.702m to be utilised in **2021/22** to support the delivery of the scheme. This scheme is funded by government grant and is being managed by Cheshire East Council.
- 3.14.3. The 2021/22 programme also includes £0.240m mitigation and compensation works associated with the new roads which are being delivered as part of the LTP & SEMMMS IT programme.

3.16. The council has very recently been awarded funding for the **Active Travel Fund Tranche 2**; this will be approximately £0.780m and will be utilised on pedestrian and cycle improvements in the town centre.

4. FINANCIAL AND RISK ASSESSMENT CONSIDERATIONS

- 4.1. Revenue and Capital consequences of report recommendations This programme is in line with the budget set at full council and the funding being made available to support Stockport's Transportation and Highways. A number of funding streams are awarded by Greater Manchester Combined Authorities and final confirmation is awaited.
- 4.2. The effect of the decision
- 4.3. That the prioritised areas of spend will be undertaken and the necessary requirements of the different funding streams be met as need. This will support the ongoing improvement and maintenance of the transport networks in the borough.
- 4.4. Risks
- 4.5. The programme will be subject to regular risk reviews as part of budget and programme monitoring. However, underspending may result in a loss of opportunity to deliver highway and transport improvements for the borough. Without a detailed funding programme for future years there has been limited scope to predict future year spending and the impact of COVID -19 has resulted in a large amount of work being rolled over from last year's budget in to the coming financial year which will have implications for deliverability that need to be carefully monitored.
- 4.6. Future savings/ efficiencies
- 4.7. Where funding is being undertaken as part of invest to save works such as the HIP and the LED lighting programme, then the resulting reduced and maintenance informed lifecycle planning in the future will enable efficiencies to be achieved.

5. **LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS**

5.1. The provision of and maintenance of highway facilities and transportation provision is an important part of the Councils overall remit and the failure to adequately fund such work may result in litigation and related financial losses.

6. HUMAN RESOURCES IMPACT

6.1. The programme will be delivered within the remit of the Councils current staff with support as necessary form the Councils framework consultancies and suppliers as funded through the relevant schemes.

7. EQUALITIES IMPACT

7.1. The elements of the programme will be subject to the relevant equality considerations as part of their detailed development. The overall programme supports the 2040 Transport Plan and its related Equality Impact Assessment

8. ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

8.1. The elements of the programme will be subject to the relevant environmental considerations as part of their detailed development. The Council seeks to procure

in a way that minimises its environmental impacts and these issues were considered in the procurement process for its framework partners and suppliers who will assist us in achieving these goals.

9. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

9.1. That the capital programme is commented on and noted and the final programme be approved by the Cabinet Member for Economy and Regeneration
