## **Community Investment: ANNUAL REPORT**

## Report of the Cabinet Member for Inclusive Neighbourhoods

## 1. SUMMARY / MATTER FOR CONSIDERATION

- 1.1. To provide an update on the Stockport Local Fund with a focus on programme investments and impact
- 1.2. Updates from the wider programme of work to support a thriving third sector and early analysis from the State of the Sector report 2020
- 1.3. To set out priority areas for development and next steps in delivering investment into the third sector in 2021/22

## 2. Background

- 2.1. In response to the State of the Sector Report in 2017 the Stockport Local Fund (SLF) launched to expand capacity in the voluntary sector to ultimately reduce demand on public services.
- 2.2. The SLF provides grants to the Voluntary, Community, Faith and Social Enterprise (VCFSE) sector to provide support for people living and working in Stockport.
- 2.3. The investment supports activities that will improve health, social and economic outcomes, and support growth in the VCFSE sector.
- 2.4. Following the formal launch in 2018, SLF has delivered 5 phases of funding with a further 2 during the pandemic to help support the community response. <u>Appendix 1 Fig 1</u>
- 2.5. Grant awards range from £200-10k, and monitoring is undertaken at 12 months where applicants provide evidence of their impact.
- 2.6. To date over 700 applications have been received to the fund and awards of over £800,000 made to 225 projects. <u>Appendix 1 Fig 2</u>
- 2.7. The delivery of the Stockport Local Fund has been complimented by a wider programme of work to support VCFSE organisations, developing infrastructure support and building partnerships between statutory and community organisations.
- 2.8. In 2020 the State of the Sector survey was commissioned at GM level to understand the impact and needs of the sector. Whilst the report methodology limits comparison with the 2017 report it will provide important insights to shape investment in and support for the VCFSE going forward.

#### 3. Covid Context

3.1. The Stockport Local Fund remains a key tool to support the sector and provide a catalyst for growth and innovation but in the context of Covid is less well able to respond to emerging challenges in a way that is sufficiently agile. The fund generates a high level of interest and expectation in a very broad range of priorities which pre-date the pandemic, and decision making can be a lengthy

- process due in part the number of applications and varying quality of these applications.
- 3.2. Modifications have been made to the small grants process to create a more responsive approach to funding that supported Covid response and there is a need to now to take a more strategic approach to ensure the fund can support and grow community capacity where is likely to be needed in the future as the longer term impacts of Covid are felt.
- 3.3. Recognising the importance of community investment to Covid recovery £500k is additionally available for allocation in year (21/22).
- 3.4. The sixth round of the fund scheduled to launch in June has been postponed until autumn to allow time both for strategic investment to be made in the sector (Section 7) and distribution of time limited central government funds (section 8). This has helped identify the gaps and emerging priorities for communities.

## 4. Progress and Impact

## 4.1. Progress

- 4.1.1. Since the last report to Scrutiny in Sept 20 two rounds of SLF have been delivered Phase 5 and a second Covid Response Phase. The former of which made £272k investment in 42 organisations, whilst 26 organisations benefited from £23k Covid Response Grants. A full list of these investments is at Appendix 3.5 and 3.6, appendix 3 also sets all SLF investments to date.
- 4.1.2. As part of the Covid response the small grant limit was increased to £1000 to ensure neighbourhood organisations had access to the funds they needed without the need to navigate a more involved process associated with the larger grants.
- 4.1.3. Whilst bids were received to support ethnically diverse and other minority groups these continue to be received from a very small number of organisations. A challenge remains to ensure both equality of access to the fund but also that wider community activity and associated funding bids are truly inclusive;

#### 4.2. Impact of Investments

- 4.2.1. The SLF Phase two provided financial stimulus to the VCFSE sector in 2019/20 and invited applications that would achieve one or more of the priorities, Appendix 2, and monitoring data from this phase is now available.
- 4.2.2. In Phase 2 SLF received 94 applications totalling £538,522. 19 grants were awarded ranging from £250-£10,000 and a total investment was made of £110,913.
- 4.2.3. Of the 19 awards made 5 were to Community Interest Companies, 4 Charities, 8 Community groups, 1 Sports Association and 1 individual.
- 4.2.4. The projects ranged in community benefit and target groups, from projects targeting a particular neighbourhood to those working with communities of identity and shared experience with many investments benefiting multiple cohorts. Appendix 3 fig3 details the nature of these investments.
- 4.2.5. In phase 2, as with other subsequent rounds, grants over £500 have been primarily awarded to organisations that work across the borough, with communities of experience or identity. In phase 2 only 1 larger investment

was linked specifically to a neighbourhood with place-based organisations tending to apply to the small grants pot. Small grants (those under £500) have been awarded primarily to place based groups working in a particular neighbourhood.

- 4.2.6. From the 19 projects awarded funding under Round 2:
  - £83,489 Cash Match funding has been secured
  - 4402 Volunteer Hours delivered
  - 10 services worked with directly including GMP, Stepping Hill, Pupil Referral Units, Stockport Homes, Adults Social Care, Stockport Family, Stockport College, Juniper, Domestic Abuse Services, Youth Offending Team.
  - 895 people reached
  - 116 hours of Workshops and Learning
  - 3500 work trials
  - 2 P.T jobs created
- 4.3. Beneficiary organisations have supported those they work with to increase in confidence, reduced anxiety and a sense of purpose.
- 4.4. Monitoring impact can often be challenging for the sector, not more so than when demand surged during Covid and it should be noted that this data is drawn from a sample of projects and does not reflect the full impact of all 19 investments. Work continues to support the sector to capture and demonstrate impact.
- 4.5. Monitoring returned from Round 2 to date has been used to produce the Year2 Impact Report 20/21 (Background Papers).
- 4.6. Investments in Round 2 furthered the pattern seen in Round 1, investing in locally based organisations who were diversifying their offer outside of the borough. Giving them confidence that Stockport was a place where their organisation was valued, could grow and have impact. Whilst also attracting organisations from neighbouring boroughs to extend projects into Stockport.
- 4.7. Whilst all investments have all fully directly benefited local residents third sector operations rarely align fully with local authority boundaries and the fund has established an important role in giving the sector confidence to operate within the borough.

### 5. Wider Progress

5.1. Funding is only part of a wider package of support to the sector that is building this confidence.

## 5.2. The Communities programme / Team Around the Place

- 5.2.1. The Communities Programme proved vital during the pandemic and was instrumental in the pandemic response, allowing services to connect and work with communities through a challenging time.
- 5.2.2. Work continues to embed multi-agency cross sector teams around the place (TAPs) in areas across Stockport with teams now operational in all 8 neighbourhoods. The TAPs provided significant support to work during the Covid outbreak, they mobilised communities quickly and provided a forum for neighbourhood connections and support. They were able to identify where

there were gaps in provision and worked with communities and services to close them, supporting and shaping bids to the Local Fund and other sources of support and investment.

5.2.3. Learning from this work has been captured to shape the next phase of the Communities Programme, and a model for neighbourhood working.

## 6. Digital Alliance

- 6.1. The importance of digital to support communities through Covid has been key. Under Phase 5 investments were made to ensure sustainability of the Digital Alliance and lending library as demand for this service soared. The SLF team worked with Renewal Northwest to redesign their Phase 5 bid to focus on refurbishment of IT hardware and maintenance of the digital library whilst also achieving their original proposals ambition to create employment opportunities and experience for ex-offenders. Direct investment was also made in Starting Point in recognition that their Phase 5 bid was constrained by the fund criteria and did not provide the type or level of investment needed to ensure the Alliance offer was robust and sustainable at a time when digital inclusion was central to well-being, learning and day to day transactions.
- 6.2. Going forward investment in digital will be considered as part of the strategic infrastructure investments made in the VCFSE to ensure the sector has the resources and support required to operate with an increased emphasis on digital.

## 7. Sector3 development

- 7.1. As reported to scrutiny in September 20 an initial investment was made in Sector 3, the infrastructure organisation for the VCFSE sector in Stockport to:
  - To bring communities together to deliver better connectivity and engagement
  - To lever in external grant pots for Stockport
  - To develop a volunteer hub
- 7.2. Sector3 have developed as a key strategic partner, bringing the VCFSE together to respond to Covid, ensure organisational and sector resilience and represented the view of excluded communities. Sector3 proved to be effective partner in the delivery of small grant programmes, administering the Community Champions Small Grants Programme (Section 8), delivering innovative funding events such as Community Soup¹ and levering in an additional funds through crowd funding and applications to national funders.
- 7.3. Details of the partnership work delivered with Sector3 is set out in Appendix 4.1
- 7.4. In the past 12 months there has been new board members appointments and recruitment a core staff team including a Chief Executive and Equalities Officer placing Sector3 in a strong position to support the sector response to the challenges ahead. Further investment is required to consolidate Sector3 as externally secured grants will fund development projects and not core running costs of the organisation.

## 8. Community Champions

- 8.1. Funding to the VCFSE has also been distributed in 2021-2 through the Stockport Community Champions programme<sup>2</sup>, Appendix 5.
- 8.2. This programme is funded non-recurrently, £650,000 for 2021-22 was received from the Ministry of Housing, Communities, and Local Government (MHCLG) Community Champions: Local Authority Fund which aims to 'support a range of interventions to build upon, increase or improve existing activities to work with residents who are most at risk of Covid-19'.
- 8.3. The programme has a number of key pillars of activity and related investment envelopes including the development of new networks, creating resilient networks, community capacity building, communication and engagement and programme management, learning and evaluation. As part of the programme funding was ringfenced to facilitate growth and collaboration within VCFSE through small and medium grants which were administered via Sector 3 and via a dedicated Community Champions Stockport Local Fund stream. Direct strategic investments in Key VCFSE delivery partners, aimed at building legacy and lasting Stockport wide networks of champion organisations supporting priority groups were also made. This report summarises investments to date.
- 8.4. Micro grants of up to £1,000 were administered by Sector 3, with 26 awards made where pre-Covid SLF have typically made less than 10 micro investments. Grants of up to £5,000 were administered via a dedicated SLF community champions funding stream which was open in May 2021. 30 applications were received for £5,000 or less of which 7 were funded.
- 8.5. The number of applications provides further evidence that larger more accessible small grants are required by a sector that is shifting and changing with community need.
- 8.6. Key themes included reducing isolation, improving health and wellbeing, helping people and communities to recover from the impact that Covid-19 has had on their life and community, re-opening community activities.
- 8.7. The Community Champions stream also invited partnership applications for up to £20K for initiatives delivered by two or more organisations working together (where SLF maximum is currently £10k). Nine bids were made for these larger amounts, of which 3 were funded. Most were from well-established organisations looking to grow and consolidate their offer.
- 8.8. Additionally, there is evidence from the Community Champions funding programme, and broader conversations with the sector that organisations are incurring increased costs as they seek to re-open. Changes to how space is used and managed, combined with reduced fundraising in the past 18 months and uncertainty about how community members will engage with community activities after an extended period away means many organisations are taking significant financial risks in re-opening.

#### 9. Holiday Activities Fund

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9.1. The Holiday Activities Fund (HAF) is a DfE programme to provide enriching activities alongside a food offer to families in receipt of benefit related Free school Meals and other vulnerable families. Mobilising volunteers and building sector

- capacity is an expressed secondary outcome of the programme. In Stockport direct investment was made in Sector3 with Street Games to ensure VCFSE organisations had the support they needed to meet required DfE standard to delivery on HAF. 24 VCFSE organisations expressed an interest and 15 are delivering as part of the summer programme.
- 9.2. A number of providers expressed an interest in delivering activities or approaches that were out of scope of strict HAF criteria and there is a need to ensure these organisations can develop their offer using other resources, harnessing the increased energy from the VCFSE to support young people who have been significantly impacted by Covid.
- 9.3. The increased focus on ensuring support and activities for young people impacted by the pandemic is bringing together VCFSE providers into a network that can ensure providers work more coherently going forward.

### 10. State of the Sector

- 10.1. The GM State of the Sector research which catalysed the Stockport Local Fund in 2017 was repeated in 2020. The research provides both a local and GM perspective of the needs and value of the sector, capturing the impact of Covid on VCFSE operations and consolidating the learning themes that have emerged from the above programmes.
- 10.2. The report identified the continued imbalance within Stockport's VCSE with 77% of organisations considered to be micro organisations (annual income <£10k) compared with 71% across GM. Of the 1,600 VCSE organisations in Stockport 40 (2.5%) are in receipt of 60% of VCFSE income.
- 10.3. Sector income is drawn from a range of sources and whilst grant continues to be an important funding source 63% of organisations have at least one source of non-public funding with 20% employing fundraising, 15% membership fees and 14% business donations/ sponsorship to ensure diverse funding streams.
- 10.4. In addition to funding VCFSE organisations mobilise significant resource through volunteer hours with 57,488 volunteers giving 213,536 each week with a value of £98m per annum. 79% of volunteer's hours were attributed to micro organisations whilst 6% of volunteer hours were attributed to medium organisations who make up 8% of the sector.
- 10.5. Partnership working has been identified as a critical factor in managing demand when challenged by limited resources and tackling health inequalities<sup>3</sup>. Relationships across the VCFSE are good with 83% of organisations having dealings with other VCFSE organisations, 89% with SMBC and 61% with private business. However these relationships have yet to translate into meaningful partnerships with only 4% of organisations reporting a great amount of dealings with the private sector and 17% with the VCFSE sector locally. A third of organisations reported that they were satisfied with their ability to influence SMBC.
- 10.6. Further analysis will be brought to a future Scrutiny committee following the publication of the Stockport and Greater Manchester full reports in September 2021

## 11. Future Plans and Next Steps

11.1. Going forward in a period of significant uncertainty for the VCFSE it is important that the approach to community investment can remain agile and respond to need whilst also providing confidence and resilience, future proofing the sector in areas where need is likely to increase.

## 11.2. **Emerging Priorities**

- 11.3. Three areas of focus have been identified where local VCFSE capacity could be enhanced: Food, Youth Activities, Equalities. In each of these areas cross sector networks have established to coordinate the local offer and develop a cohesive response to need.
- 11.4. Recognising that the established phases of bi-annual funding may constrain the community response if applications are limited to the phase 6 timeframe an allocation from SLF will be ring-fenced for themes and if appropriate delegated to the emergent cross sector networks to oversee. In so doing both consolidate their role as a collaborative forum to address community need and to move funds more efficiently to where they are needed to support the community to reorientate activities from crisis response to community resilience and ultimately recovery at a pace that works for communities as a posed to pre-set funding phases.
- 11.5. Additionally, as mentioned above the cost of re-opening is impacting organisations confidence to resume activities. Whilst the focus of SLF has, and will continue to be, growth and diversification of the sector it is important to acknowledge that is in this next phase of funding a more flexible approach to running costs may need to be taken to ensure organisations that have previously added value to communities can resume their activities with limited financial risk.

### 11.6. Larger grants up to 30k

- 11.7. In July 2020, an executive decision was taken to increase the upper limit for grant funding to ensure VCFSE organisations had the support they need during a sustained period of change. To date larger investments have been reserved for exceptional circumstances but were more widely tested under Community Champions. It is now timely to more broadly operationalise this upper limit. Making awards of up to £30k in phase 6 will both support organisational sustainability and provide an increased degree of financial certainty to allow the sector to develop their offer to meet changed community need.
- 11.8. Larger investments will be restricted to organisations with a proven track record of delivery, be made only where they are facilitating organisational development and linked to support where needed to ensure impact.
- 11.9. Work will also continue with colleagues from across all directorates to maximise fund potential and to bring services closer to the fund. The report in September 2020 set out changes in decision making where each directorate was brought closer to the decision making on investments that would directly impact their service users. Going forward the fund will be further aligned with service transformation priorities and partnerships developed between services and VCFSE organisations particularly but not exclusively where larger investments are made.

#### 11.10. Smaller Grants

- 11.11. The Voluntary sector is diverse to meet this there must be access to a diverse grant system. Simple and easy to apply for grass roots groups is particularly crucial in periods of uncertainty and change. The small grants programme must be able to respond to this need and reach all communities. As detailed above collaboration and support is a key element of small grants.
- 11.12. Sector3 have proved well placed to mobilise and deliver small grants programmes and lever private investment whilst also providing support.
- 11.13. The importance of place based support via the Team Around the Place has also proved valuable in developing grass roots community action aligned to early help priorities.
- 11.14. It is proposed that going forward the allocation of small grants is devolved to Sector3 and the place based teams linked to preventative services to allow for funding to reach deeper into communities and create local ownership of the fund, encouraging innovative applications, increasing fund visibility and maximising match funding.
- 11.15. Devolving small grants will also free capacity to quality assure these larger investments set out above.

#### 12. Sector 3

- 12.1. Sector 3 have demonstrated in a brief time the value added by a local infrastructure body, <u>appendix 4.1</u>. They are key partners in coordinating the above referenced networks and supporting wider organisational capacity building including through the mobilisation of volunteers. Work will continue with Sector 3 to develop an infrastructure organisation that is right for Stockport communities.
- 12.2. Further funding has been identified to develop the Sector3, <u>Appendix 4.2</u>, providing both a direct investment in core costs and allocations to support emerging priorities.

### 13. Internal Capacity

13.1. The SLF was setup to grow capacity in the sector, which as previously stated requires both financial investment but also support. Having people with the right skills, knowledge and expertise will be key as we enter the next phase of funding and our ambition for a thriving voluntary sector. To compliment the investment in Sector3 funding will also be used to create temporary posts that can work with the VCFSE organisations, TAPs and statutory services to build collaborative partnership networks whilst also administering a robust and transparent grant funding programme.

## 14. One Stockport

- 14.1. The launch of One Stockport in 2020 brought new focus to the narrative of 'Connected communities'. The campaign has a profile and resonance across the sectors and the potential to reconnect people to their town and bring the different communities and sectors closer together.
- 14.2. The One Stockport messaging will encourage collaboration and will create civic pride supporting growth across Stockport while tackling inequalities, it is a shared vision for how we can make best use of existing capacity and create new stronger sector co-operation.

14.3. It is therefore proposed that the Stockport Local Fund integrate into One Stockport and be launched under this banner to further consolidate the messaging of connected communities.

#### 15. Members

15.1. Elected Members remain a key stakeholder in the delivery of any community investment programme. The SLF benefits from the knowledge members have about their area, helping to raise the profile of the fund and encouraging strong applications from the areas they represent. To do this effectively members must be equipped with the right information. Communication with Elected Members will be improved with the opportunity to be engaged in local area funding workshops when these resume, and information about all activity funded in a ward will be shared with ward Members.

#### 16. Recommendations

That the committee:

Note the progress and impact of delivering the SLF in 20/21

Support the ongoing development of the related programme of work including

- The strategic investment in Sector3
- Closer alignment of small grants with Sector3
- Development of thematic networks and investment to support emerging priorities
- Endorse the alignment of the Stockport Local Fund to the One Stockport brand
- Support the launch of phase 6 in autumn
- Receive a further update on the State of the Sector

## Appendix 4 – Sector 3 and Infrastructure Impact and Investment

### 4.1 - Impact to date

Voluntary Community Faith and Social Enterprise Sector Networks (VCFSE) The VCFSE Forum established to respond to covid and co-chaired by Sector3 with SMBC has consolidated its role as a place for VCFSE collaboration and is working to ensure it is fully representative of the sector and communities. Other networks have been mapped to identify gaps and ensure connectivity between these networks and the forum to help mobilise, respond, and incorporate the perspectives of a broad spectrum of individuals, organisations, and groups.

## **Equality Network**

The Equality Network is delivered by Sector 3 committed to equality, they will develop a strong network of locally based organisations to champion inclusion and equitable outcomes for all communities. They will support organisations to develop awareness and understanding to tackle discrimination and promote social inclusion.

## The Funding Alliance

A funding alliance connecting key grant giving stakeholders has expanded its core partners from SMBC, Sector 3, Stockport Homes and Life Leisure to also inlcude Great Places and Onward Housing. The aim is to coordinate in house funding programmes and lever in external grants. The Alliance have provided workshops with external funders, training, grant searches, bid writing and actively promoted funding opportunities. In the last six months over 800k in external funding has been brought into Stockport.

#### The Volunteer Hub

A HealthWatch lead pilot Volunteer Hub ran through 20/21 in June the Volunteer Hub was formally launched in partnership with SEctor3 providing a one stop shop to make volunteering easier for those that want to get involved and to support the voluntary sector in finding volunteers. The Volunteer Hub will match prospective volunteers to volunteer involving organisations across Stockport and work to improve the number of opportunities available locally for people. They will be a voice for volunteers and celebrate their contribution to Stockport.

## One Stockport

One Stockport is a campaign consolidates the message that community connections are a fundamental part of thriving communities and a thriving third sector. Sector3 have supported organisations to engage in the campaign and make it real at the grass roots in a way that makes it tangibly beneficial for all parties. Examples include the coordinated delivery and community call to action around Christmas giving.
