


## Deprivation

Stockport – 20.8 / Tameside – 31.4 / North West – 28.1



- Tameside and Stockport differ quite dramatically when reviewing levels of deprivation and low-income families. Whilst Stockport does have pockets that fall within the 10% most deprived this equates to 8.9% of all LSOAs, for Tameside this is 20.6%.
- This disparity in deprivation is echoed in the measure percentage of children (under 16) living in low-income families.

### **Early Years School Improvement Teams**

Stockport overall aim is to: Work in strong partnership with Childminders, EY settings and Schools to support and challenge the improvement in children's achievement by the age of 5 and narrow the attainment gap.

Intent

- Support the improved leadership of the early years phase in the local area which impacts on positive outcomes for all children and families, particularly for children eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and children with Special Education Needs and Disabilities (SEND).
- Work in strong partnership with Early Years providers and EY partners to support the early identification of children at risk of poor outcomes and improve children's school readiness at the start of Year 1 in school.
- Ensure effective transitions for all children through a shared language and accurate assessment throughout the early years. (families and professionals).
- Stockport team has one EY lead (QTS); 7.8 FTE consultants and officers of which 6 have QTS
- Tameside have one team leader; one practice manager; 8 officers plus one practice manager. No QTS. One vacant post for Primary Lead (QTS) with a focus on EY and KS1
