REVIEW OF POLLING DISTRICTS, POLLING PLACES AND POLLING STATIONS

Report of the Chief Executive

1. INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE OF REPORT

- 1.1. To seek the views of the Committee on the current proposed polling arrangements within the area in order to inform the Polling District Review currently underway.
- 1.2. The first stage of the public consultation on the Review of Polling Districts, Polling Places and Polling Stations opened on 7 July 2022 and closes on 18 August 2022. Members are encouraged to submit their comments on the proposals either directly to officers by email to <u>localwardboundary@stockport.gov.uk</u> via this area committee, via a meeting with officers or via the consultation portal online <u>Polling</u> District Review Stockport Metropolitan Borough Citizen Space Citizen Space.
- 1.3. The decisions on designation of polling districts, places and stations has been delegated from the Council Meeting to the Chief Executive under Article 8 of the Council's constitution. Members' views are of course encouraged and welcomed given their valued local knowledge of their own wards and all views will be taken into consideration when coming to a decision, in addition to those of the public.
- 1.4. Once the decision has been taken all electors will be written to, to update them on any change to their polling district and/or polling station. This will be in addition to the usual poll card and further communications to residents via the usual communication channels the council uses.
- 1.5. There may be some instances where we have created some very small polling districts as part of the proposals included in this report. These have been created to enable supply of the relevant parts of the registers councillors are currently entitled to. This is because the revised electoral register for the new wards, following the Local Government Boundary Review, will be published on 1st December 2022. However, by law, currently elected Councillors will not be entitled to copies of the register for the new wards until they become a candidate for the 2023 Local Elections, as the new wards devised by the LGBCE are not the electoral areas Councillors have been elected to represent at this time. Councillors will still be entitled to the annual register and monthly updates for the old wards which they are currently elected to represent.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The Local Government Boundary Commission for England has undertaken a review of the Council's electoral arrangements and made recommendations for new warding patterns, to be used for the May 2023 Local Elections onwards.
- 2.2 Accordingly, a review of polling districts should be undertaken to ensure appropriate arrangements are in place for May 2023, relating to polling district

boundaries within wards and the polling stations that will serve these new districts. This review will cover the drawing of new polling district boundaries within wards, and the designating of polling places to serve those districts.

- 2.3 Schedule A1 of the Representation of the People Act 1983 prescribes the statutory steps for an authority conducting a polling district review.
- 2.3 The responsibility for designating polling districts is a Council Meeting function which has been delegated to the Council's Chief Executive under Article 8 of the Constitution. In drawing up polling district boundaries the Council must ensure that all electors in the area have such reasonable facilities for voting as are practicable in the circumstances.
- 2.4 The Council must also designate a polling place for every polling district. This is usually within the boundary of the polling district unless there are special circumstances e.g. a lack of suitable buildings. This is a Council Meeting function which has also been delegated to the Council's Chief Executive under Article 8 of the Constitution.
- 2.5 In designating polling places, the Council must:

a) Seek to ensure that all the electors in the constituency have such reasonable facilities for voting as are practicable in the circumstances;

b) Seek to ensure that so far as is reasonable and practicable, the polling places they are responsible for are accessible to all electors, including those who are disabled, and when considering the designation of a polling place, must have regard to the accessibility needs of disabled persons. There should be no barriers to voting for people with a disability. Any access issues identified by Disability Stockport will be considered as part of the review.

- 2.6 A polling district is a sub-area, an electoral area (such as a ward or constituency) is divided into, for the purposes of delivering an election. A polling place is the building or area in which polling stations will be located. A polling place within a polling district must be designated so that polling stations are within easy reach of all electors from across the polling district. The polling station is the actual room or area where the voting takes place.
- 2.7 Some of the proposed polling districts are smaller in these proposals than in the previous electoral arrangements for the Council. The reason for this is to enable publication of the Electoral Register on the new boundaries on the 1st December 2022 while retaining the ability to provide currently elected Councillors with copies and updates of the register into 2023.
