PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

To summarise the outcome of the public consultation on the MCF Bee Network Crossings scheme proposals in Edgeley, Stockport in order for a decision to be taken as to whether the proposals should be progressed to the detailed design and delivery stage.

INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

In partnership with Stockport Metropolitan Borough Council (MBC), Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM) are looking to make some changes in the Edgeley Road area of Edgeley, Stockport, with the aim of helping make the neighbourhood safer and more pleasant, enabling more people to walk, cycle or wheel for everyday journeys. The proposals include:

- A new signal junction at Northgate Road / Edgeley Road and a new segregated cycle crossing facility to connect Edgeley Fold and Northgate Road, improving access to the park and school.
- New 'green man' pedestrian crossing facilities at the existing signal junction of Edgeley Road / Dale Street.
- Changes to the existing gate and bollards on the Cheadle Old Road path in Alexandra Park to improve access for those using double buggies, mobility scooters, adapted cycles, etc.
- The introduction of new double yellows at several locations including Northgate Road, Edgeley Road, Edgeley Fold and Cheadle Old Road, to improve sight lines and safety for all road users.

To gather people's views and opinions on the proposed changes, TfGM ran a public consultation between 15th June 2022 and 5th July 2022.

At the launch of the consultation, copies of the leaflet shown in Appendix B were hand delivered by Stockport MBC officers to the approximately 170 properties located within the area shown in Appendix C. The letter shown in Appendix D was also hand delivered to the 6 properties most directly affected by the proposals. To further raise awareness of the consultation, posters and signs (as shown in Appendix E) were placed on lighting columns in the area. A news release to promote the consultation was also jointly issued by TfGM and Stockport MBC, resulting in a Manchester Evening News article. Both organisations also promoted the consultation via social media channels. The consultation materials and online survey could also be found via the TfGM Active Travel webpages and Stockport Council's online consultation hub.

Responses to the consultation could be submitted via the online survey or to TfGM Customer Relations, via email, telephone, or post.





In total, 88 respondents submitted comments to the received to the online survey. In addition, 6 responses were also submitted to TfGM Customer Relations by email.




Figure 1. Postcode are SK3 9

The majority of responses were received from residents who live in SK3 9 postcode area (47 out of 88), the boundary of which is shown in Figure 1, below. A full list of the postcodes of respondents (up to the 1st inward code character) is available in Appendix A.

CONSULTATION RESULTS

Proposal 1: Edgeley Road at the junction with Northgate/ Edgeley Fold


Most respondents to the online survey agreed with the proposals for Edgeley Road at the junction with Northgate/ Edgeley Fold, with 71% (62) either agreeing or strongly agreeing with the proposed new signalised junction and 'green man' crossings and 63% (55) either agreeing or strongly agreeing with the proposed cycle crossing facilities (see Figures 2 and 3 and Table 1, below).



Figure 4: Perceptions of impact of proposal at Northgate/Edgeley Fold among respondents. Shown as percentage of respondents



Some examples of the types of supportive comments received in relation to the proposals for Edgeley Road at the junction with Northgate/ Edgeley Fold are as follows:

- 'As a local resident with a young child I have often felt unsafe crossing at this junction. I'm also very supportive of any measures which encourage local people to walk and cycle rather than drive for their own health and wellbeing and also to reduce school traffic at Alexandra Park Primary. My child attends this school and traffic in the streets surrounding the school is a big problem and there are safety issues at peak times.'
- 'This is a really useful route across a busy road. Currently you have to illegally cycle on the footways in order to get across the road, so this will be a great improvement particular for getting to the local primary school'
- 'I live in the vicinity of the junction and use the existing crossing every day. Reinforcing the residential nature of the area will bring multiple benefits.'

Some examples of the types of objections received in relation to the proposals for Edgeley Road at the junction with Northgate/ Edgeley Fold are as follows:

- 'The existing pedestrian lights stop traffic & allow vehicles to exit Northgate Rd left OR right onto Edgeley Rd. In 20 years of living on Northgate Rd, I have never considered this junction to be problematic.'
- 'As regards the cycle way, the fact it intersects a pavement will potentially cause collisions with pedestrians and would lead to cyclists potentially using pavements endangering pedestrians.'
- 'My concern is parking, I live at 6 edgeley fold and have daily issues with people parking outside my house either teachers from the school, people at the park or anyone living on edgeley road. I cannot support UNLESS you make the whole of edgeley fold permit only







and residents get the permits. You cannot take away parking spots which is used every day and not expect impact.'

- 'I'm unsure as to why we would need a cycle lane attaching these two roads.'
- 'Also what about the motorcycle issue? There are regular people on motorbikes whizzing up and down edgeley fold will love this idea of a cycle lane, you are making it easier for them to do this.'
- '...if my children are playing out the front I don't want to be worrying if cyclists are going to speed round the corner and knock the over.'
- 'also the tree has been there for years and is loved by many as a little spot to sit on.'

All open comments provided in relation to the proposals at the Edgeley Road junction with Northgate Road and Edgeley Fold can be found in Appendix F and Appendix G.

Proposal 2: Edgeley Road/ Dale Street

Most respondents to the online survey agreed with the proposals for new 'green man' crossings at the existing Edgeley Road / Dale Street traffic signals, with 80% (71 respondents) either agreeing or strongly agreeing with the proposal. 8 respondents disagreed or strongly disagreed.

Figure 5: Level of agreement as a percentage of respondents to the online survey to the proposal at Edgeley Road/Dale Street



Figure 6: Perceptions of impact of proposal at Edgeley Road/Dale Street among respondents. Shown as percentage of respondents



Examples of the types of supportive comment received in relation to the proposals for Edgeley Road / Dale Street include:

- 'This is MUCH needed. This crossing is difficult to navigate as an adult, crossing with children is scary. I will change the route I take into Edgeley to avoid this walking down side streets to cross lower down dale street or crossing further up NR Northgate road to avoid it when I am with my children. This is not a safe crossing for a pedestrian.'
- 'It is terrifying trying to cross with a buggy at the moment'
- 'When crossing Dale Street at the junction of Edgelely Road it very dangerous, you have no time to cross between red lights forcing you to cross when the lights are green.'

Examples of the types of unsupportive comments received in relation to the proposals for Edgeley Road / Dale Street include:

- 'We already have lights stopping traffic and this allows pedestrians to cross.'
- 'I wish to object to this Bee Network. I am 78 I cross Dale Street and Edgeley Road 3 times a day and in the 33 years I have lived here no accidents with pedestrians or bikes I have seen none. The trouble is cars like to go through the lights when on red when turning the corner of Edgeley Toad and Dale Street, children always have a phone on reading it when crossing the road, bikes with earphones on cannot hear the traffic on the main road, speeding on Edgeley Road takes place early hours (80 miles per hour).'

Proposal 3: Cheadle Old Road path

Respondents to the survey were invited to suggest how the existing Cheadle Old Road path through Alexandra Park could be improved for cycling and walking and the responses have been grouped into themes in the table below, with the number of respondents who raised each theme provided.

An example of a supportive quote that was received in relation to the proposals for the Cheadle Old Road path can be found below:

- 'Again, a move for 'the greater good'. A residential area, with recreational facilities for the residents. Want to feel as safe as possible in these areas.'
- 'Better lighting would be a good idea.'

Examples of less supportive quotes that were received in relation to the proposals for the Cheadle Old Road path include:

- *'While a good thing this is just an update to current standards which is good but not really needed urgently, sure the money could be better spent elsewhere.'*
- 'I do not think that this proposal is necessary, and the financial outlay will not reflect the benefit.'

Figure 7: Level of agreement, as a percentage of respondents to the online survey, to each double yellow line proposal

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

Figure 8: Perceptions of impact of double yellow line proposal among respondents. Shown as percentage of respondents



Examples of supportive quotes that were received in relation to the proposals for additional double yellow lines on Edgeley Road at the junction with Northgate Road and Edgeley Fold can be found below:

- 'It would make it more likely we would visit Alexandra Park as a family.'
- 'Parking at the Northgate Rd / Edgeley Rd junction currently causes blockages & traffic congestion on Northgate.'

Examples of unsupportive quotes received in relation to the proposals for additional double yellow lines on Edgeley Road at the junction with Northgate Road and Edgeley Fold include:

- 'Double yellows on Old Chapel St / Northgate junction will simply move traffic further up those 2 roads making it even harder for residents to park (potentially leading to dangerous parking on junctions elsewhere)'
- 'There is already insufficient parking and these lines are not necessary if the lights are not installed'







- 'Some of the proposals are not directly outside residential properties so I am more supportive of these but I believe each resident should be able to park one car outside or close by their property and I believe the extent of the current proposals would put pressure on parking capacity for residents.'
- 'displaced traffic will park elsewhere'










Figure 10: Level of agreement, as a percentage of respondents to the online survey, to the survey guestion: "To what extent do you agree or disagree that as a result of the proposals you are more likely to walk or cycle to work, leisure, school or to visit family or friends?"





In partnership with Stockport Council, we have developed the following proposals which we would like your feedback on.




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

There are a series of proposals which we would like to introduce in Edgeley, on Edgeley Road and the surrounding areas. The proposals include:

- A new signal junction* at Northgate Road / Edgeley Road and a new segregated cycle crossing facility to connect Edgeley Fold and Northgate Road, improving access to the park and school.
- New 'green man' pedestrian crossing facilities at the existing signal junction of Edgeley Road / Dale Street.
- Changes to the existing gate and bollards on the Cheadle Old Road path in Alexandra Park to improve access for those using double buggies, mobility scooters, adapted cycles, etc.
- The introduction of new double yellows at several locations including Northgate Road, Edgeley Road, Edgeley Fold and Cheadle Old Road, to improve sight lines and safety for all road users.

*As part of these changes, one small street tree will need to be removed; this will be replaced with at least 2 new trees within the vicinity. In addition, the existing bus stop and shelter on Edgeley Road, to the east of Northgate Road, will need to be moved further east clear of the junction.



Traffic calming/reduction measures must be intensified on residential roads.
